1'm happy to report that Rother District Council has recently switched to a green electricity supplier, and we're on track to achieve our carbon neutral target for energy use (heating and power) by 2030.

At a meeting with MPs Huw Merriman (Bexhill & Battle) and Sally-Ann Hart (Hastings & Rye), we discussed the cladding on the seafront Landmark flats and the horrific discharge of sewage into the sea.

I've been involved with two controversial planning issues this autumn. The Secretary of State is reviewing planning permission for a 'carbon negative' house in the AONB near Sedlescombe. Now we're considering the proposal for a 'Center Parcs' style holiday village with 200+ cabins on the Normanhurst estate in Catsfield.

At the Tree event in October, I had to laugh when my husband John was persuaded to be a flower and got pollinated by a bee!

Access to the new hospital in Mount View Street is still concerning some residents. The only vehicle / pedestrian access will be from Mount View Street.

TIPS FOR WARMER HOMES

In case you can't make the event, Rother Greens recommend:

- add insulation to your house, in particular the loft, get specialist advice • have your boiler serviced annually and replace it if it's inefficient • ensure you have good central heating controls, ideally a smart thermostat, and use them
- turn radiator thermostats right down in rooms you're not using and shut the door • draught-proof gaps around doors, windows, loft hatch, skirtings & chimney • thermal curtains on your windows will make a noticeable difference . look out for information about Warm Spaces in Bexhill.

GREENS WIN IN MARESFIELD

Greens get elected! Another District Council seat in East Sussex has 'gone Green'. On 22nd September, Ian Tysh was elected to represent Maresfield ward on Wealden District Council, with over 60% of the votes in a 2-way contest with the Conservative Party. Some of our Rother members went over to Maresfield to help with the campaign.

Councillor Tysh, a retired solicitor, has already persuaded the council to oppose Gatwick expansion, and says his priorities are: • Helping people with the cost of living crisis • Car speeding and road safety • No building without proper infrastructure • Stopping the discharge of sewage into rivers and streams



The Greens now hold **four** seats on Wealden District Council.

WATER!

Despite the terrible weather, Rother Green Party members and friends supported the



Human Wave event on Sunday 2nd October at Bexhill Beach. Over 300 people made a 'human wave' to show we are truly unhappy about the discharge of raw sewage into the sea near Bexhill and were featured in national TV news. For much of the long hot summer. Bexhill beach was declared "not safe" for sea bathing which reduced visitor numbers and our busy summer traders lost money. And water pollution isn't the only problem: despite the recent wet weather, our area is in fact classified as 'semi-desert', which means we use more water than falls in our area. Rainfall is decreasing, so water supply is a problem too.

WHAT CAN WE DO? • Join in any protests and sign any petitions that you can, to force Southern Water to take notice.

- Use as little water as possible: shower for a maximum of 4 minutes and turn the water off when you're not rinsing.

 Make sure any hard surfaces outside your home can let water through, so water goes back into the ground and not into the drains.
- Vote for a party you can trust to look after our water. In June 2022, the Conservative government voted *against* a law to stop water companies from pumping untreated waste into our rivers and seas. Southern Water has no plans to stop storm sewer pollution. • The Green Party says water should be managed by people whose core interest is water not money. The money we pay through our bills should be spent on: fixing leaks; building new pipes and pumps; and keeping our water safe (not on bonuses).
